5th EFNS Congress, Copenhagen, Denmark, 14 - 18 October 2000

Neurologists who were brave enough to come to the far North of Europe late in the year did not only find out that the weather can be lovely in Copenhagen even in October but were rewarded by a perfectly organized meeting and an excellent scientific programme. Arvid Carlson, Nobel Laureate in Medicine 2000, honoured the congress by giving a lecture at the opening session on "Can we improve the current treatment of Parkinson's disease?"

The congress started with thirteen teaching courses. Participants evaluated the courses, and the result was more than satisfactory. The mine main topics were: Primary and Secondary Prevention of Stroke; Presurgical Evaluation in Focal Epilepsy; Neuropathic Pain; Controversies in Pathogenetic Mechanisms of Movement Disorders; Cost-effectiveness of Treatment in Neurology; Vascular and Inflammatory versus Molecular Factors in Dementia; MS-Disease Progression an Addiction Related Neurological Disorders. For the first time lay speakers were invited to give a talk within the framework of main topics. Thirty focused workshops dealt with very specialized neurological problems. Sixty-five submitted abstracts had been accepted for oral presentation and around 500 as posters. The three poster prizes consisting of a grant for attendance of the World Congress of Neurology in London in June 2001 were awarded for the following posters.
